

Bangladesh Update

Dear Family and Friends,

May 2016

A cyclone whirling without and double hurricanes churning within...this describes the past few days here in Bangladesh.

Cyclone Roanu came ashore Saturday afternoon damaging hundreds of homes and killing over 20 people. God protected our area though. We only had 2 uprooted trees and lots of fallen branches. Please pray for the Bangladeshis affected by this storm, especially those who live on the islands. They are once more rebuilding their homes and their lives.

Along with the physical storm, we have been dealing with two inner storms. The first inner storm to hit was a new law prohibiting unregistered nursing schools in Bangladesh. All nursing schools must be approved by the government and must follow the government curriculum. Up to this point, we have been advised by our Bangladeshi administrative staff to continue as an unregistered school. With the new law in place, this is suddenly no longer possible. We currently have 24 nursing students who are finishing the 1st year of our 3-year training program. We need wisdom to know how to navigate this storm. We desire to honor God's name, follow the government regulations, and provide for the students who have committed so much of their lives to us. We appreciate your prayers for wisdom!

The second inner storm hit immediately after the first. On May 11th, we received the Pii report from the ABWE and Donn Ketcham Investigation. From 1966-1989, Dr. Donn Ketcham sexually abused 23 missionary children and women in Bangladesh. The information in the report is heartbreaking and very disturbing! I was literally nauseated as I read it! I and the majority of my teammates were not here in Bangladesh when these horrible events took place. Most of us have never met Donn Ketcham, nor do we know the victims. However, his sin and subsequent events from 1989 to the present, are affecting us all. We are filled with immense sorrow over the pain the victims and their families have been suffering for many years, and we've been praying specifically for God to heal their hearts, their lives, and these deep, deep wounds.

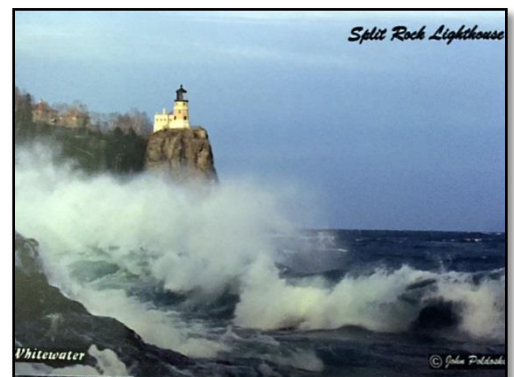
Formal, independent investigation of this issue began 5 years ago. Many of us thought the report would bring about some closure, but this is not the case. Our Area Director and others came to our field this past weekend to meet with us and answer our questions. For many of us, our trust in ABWE administration has been damaged, and it will take time for them to demonstrate that they truly are trustworthy.

Much has changed on our field since the 1980s. Our team culture has changed, our policies have changed, and we have better accountability. Over the next weeks and months, we as a team will be reviewing these to see how we can improve them even more. We appreciate your prayers!
